San Francisco Close Juvenile Hall Workgroup Update

October 2020









Close Juvenile Hall Ordinance

- Close Juvenile Hall Ordinance was passed on June 18, 2019.
- It requires San Francisco to close Juvenile Hall by December 31, 2021, expand community-based alternatives to detention, and provide a rehabilitative, non-institutional place or places of detention in location(s) approved by the Court.

 - Assignments Undertaken

Subcommittees

- Data and Needs Assessment
 - 20 youth is target (Now youth prison DJJ population)
 - Majority of Youth are Detained for Technical Violations, Warrants and Non-Violent Offenses
 - O Greatest Proportion of Detention for "Technical Violations or Warrants" are "Warrant 602"
 - Despite Numeric Reductions, Significant Racial and Ethnic Disparity Persists
 - O Girls comprise small percentage but with serious behavioral and mental health issues
 - Odds of Detention in Juvenile Hall, Once Referred to Probation, are Increasing
 - Proportionally, Youth Detained for Less Serious Reasons, Has Increased
 - Costs of Incarceration per Youth Increasing (\$275,000 annually)

Subcommittees (cont.)

- Programs/Mental Health
 - 42 Programs Serving Incarcerated Youth Identified (out of custody)
 - 32 Programs (In-Custody)
 - O Identifying Gaps in Mental Health Services especially gender responsive services
- Reinvestment and Policy
 - O DPH,SFUSD,DCYF & JPD= 24 million

- Physical Plant
- Contact Location (s)
- Security Levels
- Space Function
- Staffing
- Transportation
- O Behavioral Management/Youth Development Model
- <u>Labor</u>

Qualities of a Youth Development Centered Youth Facility

- No more than 30 youth
- Non-correctional setting
- Therapeutic environment
- Home-like living units/rooms
- Adequate space to support and equipment to support high quality education
- Adequate space and equipment for program and for individual counseling
- Adequate recreation space in and outdoors
- Kitchen and dining space including youth participation
- O Positive Youth Development trained staff
- Behavior management/youth development program

Next Steps

- Expand community alternatives mandated in legislation
- Reach alignment on "rehabilitative non-institutional place of detention"
- O Timeline for budgets and data necessary to meet our deadline
- O Secure actual real estate for secure residential homelike centers
